# Fantastic fungi: Movers and shapers of forest ecosystems

#### June 1

Fungi are often overlooked and definitely underappreciated. Yet these diverse and highly evolved organisms are critical to function of forest ecosystems. Their varied lifestyles provide roles as symbiotic mutualists, nature's recyclers, or disease-causing tree pathogens. **Glen Stanosz**, Professor of Tree and Forest Health, will discuss why fungi profoundly influence the initiation, development, composition, stability, and change of forests.

# Bald Eagle Biology and Ecology June 8

Join **Joe Henry** for a discussion on the biology and ecology of bald eagles. Learn how to identify bald eagles at all life stages, and hear about the nesting success in Wisconsin. Joe will also discuss what types of trees eagles like to nest in and will also cover the eagle surveys conducted by the DNR that show how the species population has changed over the past 50 years.

#### Restoring the Vegetation of Lower Green Bay June 15

Historically, lower Green Bay was home to an expansive wetland complex, but a number of factors have contributed to the substantial loss of lower Green Bay wetlands. The loss of this habitat has important impacts on recreational opportunities, fish and wildlife resources, and the economy. Join **Patrick Robinson** to examine the history of lower Green Bay and discuss current efforts to restore and expand habitat related to this globally important resource.

#### Plum and Pilot Islands - Where Nature and History come to life June 22

Come learn about the current condition of the maritime safety buildings, US Fish and Wildlife and Friends of Plum and Pilot Islands plans for preservation. **Paul Schmacher** will discuss the natural world value of the islands, including bird nesting, stopover points during migration, the plant communities, invasive species control and regeneration of the maple/oak forest in light of deer browsing.

Discussion will touch on the geologic history of the islands, and long-term use of the islands for maritime safety.

# Journey of a Thousand Lifers June 29

Join **Bill Volkert** as he presents an around-the-world trip that he and his wife Connie took from September 2014 through April 2015. Traveling for nearly 8 months, they covered twelve counties from southern Africa to India and Southeast Asia, sighting more than 1,300 species of birds and over a thousand lifers. They traveled 55,000 miles and took 35,000 pictures to capture their adventures. This program provides an overview of their travels and some of the amazing wildlife and wild places they visited. This truly was a trip of a lifetime,

### I Heart Wisconsin River Trip July 6

**Ruth Oppedahl**, Executive Director of the Natural Resources Foundation of Wisconsin, will share her experience of a 18 day paddle from the source of the Wisconsin River to the confluence with the Mississippi. As a positive response to the state's budget cuts to natural resources, Ruth decided to use her vacation exploring our state from north to south and meeting with conservation groups and citizens along the way to learn how they help protect our lands, waters and wildlife.

### Rainbow of the Lakes – Current Research on Iris lacustris July 13

Dwarf lake iris (*Iris lacustris*) is a rare, endemic plant with populations restricted to the northern shores of Lakes Michigan and Huron. In Wisconsin, the flower only occurs in Brown and Door Counties, with one of the most expansive populations located at The Ridges Sanctuary. **Vanessa Brotske**, a current graduate student at the University of Wisconsin – Green Bay, will discuss her current research involving pollination, seed dispersal, and germination of this rare plant.

### Lichens of the North Woods July 20

Lichens are a well-represented component of any healthy ecosystem. Though we all see lichens, few people notice them and even fewer understand the biology, ecology, and magic of lichens. Join **Joe Walewski**, author of *Lichens of the North Woods*, for an introduction to lichens of The Ridges.

# **Piping Plover** July 27

After a more than a 75-year absence from the area as a breeder, the endangered Piping Plover was documented breeding in Green Bay the summer of 2016. Piping Plovers have been attracted to the Cat Island Wave Barrier restoration site for the past several years and in 2016 the first recorded nest in Brown County history was found. Join **Joshua Martinez** as he discusses management of the Cat Island Wave Barrier site that is done in partnership between Wisconsin DNR, U.S. Fish and Wildlife, Brown County Port Authority, and others.

### Chinook Salmon and Steelhead Management for Lake Michigan August 3

Wisconsin DNR fisheries biologist **Nick Legler** will share information on fisheries management for Lake Michigan. This presentation will focus mostly on Chinook salmon and steelhead. Topics may include fisheries management history, recent survey results, ongoing research, and recent management efforts.

### Using Citizen Science to Track Great Lakes Fish Migration August 10

Shedd Aquarium and partners are engaged in two projects using citizen scientists to document fish migrations in the Great Lakes. The first project involves a concentrated effort to document sucker spawning migrations across a latitudinal gradient in Lake Michigan and Lake Superior, with the purpose of identifying temperature and flow levels that trigger the onset of migration. The second project involves an opportunistic approach whereby anglers document their observations into the Great

Lakes Fish Finder app. Join **Dr. Karen J. Murchie** to learn how you can join in the efforts!

### Plant Disease Management August 17

Gardeners everywhere have suffered losses of vegetables, flowers, trees and shrubs due to plant diseases. An understanding of how plant diseases get into your yard or garden, and how they are able to infect your plants, can help you develop strategies to avoid serious problems. **Dr. Brian Hudelson** (aka "Dr. Death"), Director of the Plant Disease Diagnostics Clinic at the University of Wisconsin-Madison College of Agricultural and Life Sciences, will talk about how plant diseases occur and how they affect your plants. Strategies for preventing and managing plant diseases will be discussed to help you be more successful in the upcoming growing season!

# Aquatic Plants and Animals of Wisconsin Lakes

#### August 24

**Paul Skawinski** will discuss the diversity of aquatic plants and animals in Wisconsin lake ecosystems. From carnivorous bladderworts to fast-flying dragonflies, our lakes contain a myriad of fascinating organisms. This presentation will discuss ecology and identification of these plants and animals.

### Karner Blue Butterfly August 31

**Chelsea Gunther** will be discussing the Federally endangered Karner blue butterfly's history, ecology, and importance. She will explain Karner population estimates from the last 9 years and how we obtain them. Chelsea will also talk about what recovery work is being done now, and why recovery efforts are important, especially in Wisconsin.

#### **By-Laws Changes Proposal**

Members will be asked to approve a number of By-Laws changes and updates (last amended in 2012). Many changes were simple grammatical changes; some were a little more involved.
